Presidents Report

Here's to a good 2011! So far we have had an easy winter in eastern Ontario with very little precipitation (unlike some other parts of the province). As of January 1, most of our fields are bare and we have experienced very few days with cold temperatures. Fortunately we are expecting snow in a day or two. It continues to be amazing how we seem to escape the worst extremes of weather that other parts of the continent have endured these past few weeks. We have dodged the damaging rains, winds, and below normal temperatures that have caused challenges elsewhere.

I feel the outlook for horticulture in general remains bright for the upcoming year. The public has a very positive attitude towards the fruits and vegetables which are our main crops. The press can't seem to write enough positive information on the health benefits of a diet weighted heavily in favour of fruits and vegetables. We can count our blessings that we are not marketing beef, pork, or dairy products as all of these commodities have major marketing challenges.

On the cautionary side of things, I would draw your attention yet again to what I will refer to as the "Wal-Mart Phenomenon". When Wal-Mart burst onto the marketing scene in our area, people commented that they would avoid the big American giant and continue to shop locally and support our Canadian retailers. In 2011 we have a Wal-Mart in most communities of

10,000 or more and they are thriving. On a day when most parking lots are 1/3 full, Wal-Mart's are packed. In my opinion, there are three main reasons for this success....price, price, and price.

The lessons for us in horticulture are clear. Our customers will only support price disparity in products like strawberries up to a certain point (i.e. California strawberries vs local strawberries). If we push the limits of price we could experience the Wal-Mart Phenomenon in the marketing of strawberries, raspberries, blueberries, and vegetables in Ontario. Fair and competitive pricing, excellent customer service, and interesting rural experiences seem to be the route to take to maintain and grow our market share.

I'm looking forward to many good experiences in St. Catharines in February. The conference promises to be just as informative and interesting as ever. See you there!


From OBGA Headquarters

Achene Report

As many of you may have heard on the news Ghesquiere Plant Farms is now officially bankrupt. When you see the list of how much is owed to different people it almost makes me glad that they only owed the OBGA approximately what they did. Some of this money is for plant's purchased from the OBGA to go into their screen house, some is for plant check-off (the \$5.00 / thousand that we pay to the propagator and they remit to the OBGA), and there is a fair bit of money for royalties. Fortunately for OBGA the royalties that we did not get paid are not a huge loss to us because most of that money would have been sent on to the Plant Variety Rights holder. The total loss according to our records is aproximatly \$40,000, although some monies owing have not been reported (royalties and check-off)

The Achene committee has decided to DNA sample all strawberry and raspberry cultivars in the screen house in new Liskeard every other year from now on. We have been sampling 1/3 of the varieties every year but for several reasons most importantly being to ensure the trueness to type (to give the Ontario growers the best possible plants) we are changing this to every second year.

We are in the process of trying to get a license for Polka which is a fall bearing Raspberry cultivar that looks very good. It is similar season to Autumn Britten and has good fruit quality. It may be worth looking into in the future if you grow fall bearing raspberries.

Grower Requested Own Use Program

The GROU program has been developed to try and bring a price discipline mechanism for Agricultural pesticides by allowing growers to import the US version of a Canadian registered product, once approved for the Program by Health Canada.

There are several products that have been approved for growers to import into Canada and most of these come at significant savings to what growers are paying in Canada. The entire list can be found at www.hc-sc.gc.ca/cps-spc/pest/agri-commerce/import/grou-piapda/index-eng.php as well as information needed to apply for a GROU import certifiicate.

Each year additional products are added but the products that are part of this program have typically been registered in Canada for at least 7 – 10 years.

The following products may be of interest to berry growers. Apollo and

Agri-mek miticides, and 2,4-D Amine herbicide. If you are growing other commodities you may find other products that might be worth investigating. Savings of 50% on the cost of some pest control products has been noted.

The GROU program was created for the benefit of Canadian farmers. An application for a GROU Import Certificate, with proof of participation in an acceptable container disposal program, must first be submitted to the PMRA for review and approval before a farmer can import the US version of the Canadian registered products listed in the table above. The GROU products must be purchased and imported by growers for their own use on their land, and for one growing season only.
